

## **PREFACE/ FROM THE DESK OF PRINCIPAL**

It's a matter of privilege and pleasure for me to present the re- accreditation report of Baliram Patil Arts, Commerce and Science College, Kinwat to the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore.

Kinwat Shikshan Sanstha's, Baliram Patil Arts, Commerce and Science College was established in the year 1972 and is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded (MS). The college is recognized under UGC's 2 (f) and 12 (b). It is the only college in the town having commerce and science stream at UG level. The Institution being the oldest and multifaculty UG College, it attracts large number of the students. The college has a total strength of 844 students, of which 493 are male and 351 female. 51 % students belong to reserved, backward and poor socio – economic background.

The institution provides sports, NSS, NCC, cultural and allied facilities to its students. In addition to this, the institution has Women's cell, girls, hostel, boy's hostel, anti- ragging cell and a well-equipped library.

The college has qualified and devoted faculty taking its number to 23. In addition to the permanent faculty, the college engages qualified visiting faculty in various subjects numbering '14'. The college has '13' members engaged in non-teaching and administrative departments. The college offers three UG courses (BA, B.Com and B.Sc) having '14' different departments (Arts -07, Commerce -01, Science -06). Our faculty remains active in cultivating research culture in the premises through undertaking UGC- MRP's and pursuing doctoral programmes. 10 faculty members of our college are Ph.D, '05' are M.Phil and '06' are pursuing their doctoral studies. 06 of our faculty members are recognized as research guides of S.R.T.M.U. Nanded. Two research students completed their Ph.D. in zoology from this institution and 08 students are pursuing their doctoral program under the supervision of our faculty members from various departments. We encourage our faculty to organize, participate and contribute in the seminars, workshops and conference. The institution feels proud of being serving the rural and tribal masses educationally and socially, thus bringing light into their lives and contributing in the national development through strengthening its human resource. In January 2004, the college had successfully faced the first cycle of NAAC with 'C++' grade. The recommendations made by peer term



have been implemented to the utmost. The re- accreditation report has now been prepared following the guidelines of NAAC by focusing on all seven criterions. This report is synergic outcome of all elements of our institutions. The NAAC steering committee members, IQAC members have toiled day in and day out to bring RAR in the present form. ## Executive Summary

### Criteria I- Curricular Aspects:

The college runs UG level programmes of Arts, Commerce and science streams and is affiliated to SRTMU, Nanded . It follows the curriculum designed by the university. The college not being autonomous has no direct role in syllabus framing. However, indirectly through the faculty of our college who are elected as BOS members, the college registers its say on curriculum planning, designing, implementation and development. Feedback from all the sections who are directly and indirectly influenced by the course content is formally and informally collected. The same is studied and analyzed to assess and understand the need of stakeholders regarding curriculum and forwarded to the university through proper channel. To realize effectively the objectives of curriculum, the faculty not only plans its teaching programme through annual teaching report ( ATR) and daily teaching report (DTR) , but it also emphasizes on imparting skills and knowledge based on practical study in the form of field tours. It examines the students learning outcome through arranging internal tests on unit taught, conducting seminars and thereby identifying slow and advance learners who need diverse teaching approaches. Apart from inculcating academic skills which the curriculum prescribes, the college is keen on developing life skills which help them to survive in the outer world through various extra co-curricular activities. The faculty keeps themselves abreast of all emerging trends in their respective subjects by attending workshops and publishing research papers in national, international, state level journals. Our faculty actively register their participations in workshops to keep themselves updated on restructured syllabus and to contribute their expertise in the same. In order to hone their professional skill, the college motivates and relieves its faculty to attend faculty development programmes such as refresher, orientation and short term course.

### Criteria-II -Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation is the backbone of every Higher Education Institute. All the major policies of HEI's revolve around Teaching-learning process. Students being the centre of this process, utmost care is taken that no student is left unsatisfied. The admission process adopted by our institution is in line with the regulations framed by the Govt. of Maharashtra where in reservations for SC/ST/OBC students and 33% reservations



for female students is granted. The Admission process is transparent and a committee appointed to look after the admissions helps the students seek admissions based on their Interests and skills. The committee offers psychological and financial counseling to the students. The prospectus of our college contains all the details such as vision, mission, objectives, admission process and fee, faculty information, Co-curricular and extra curricular activities conducted by college annually. The college being a tribal and rural one, 51 % of our students are SC/ |ST/OBC/Minority and 42 % of our students are female which is in line with the University and state government policy. To cater to the diverse needs of students, the students are identified as advanced and slow learners based on their performance in tests, seminars and class-room interactions. The slow learners are given remedial coaching in the zero hours so as to bring them at par. The advanced learners are provided with different reference books, information of websites and other study material to match their pace of learning. The teaching learning process adopted in the college is the blend of tradition and modernity. Lecture method along with the use of ICT is the feature of Teaching –Learning methodology adopted in our college. Apart from it, seminars, group discussion, class-room interaction, test and tutorials is also adopted. The faculty of our college are not only qualified but committed towards students and the society. The testimony of this is the higher qualification degrees possessed by them & the awards and honours conferred from time to time. Out of the 19 faculty, 09 are Ph.D, 05 are M.Phil and 03 are SET/NET. 06 faculty members are actively engaged in pursuing research. Our faculty is regularly encouraged by the IQAC cell of our college to attend seminars, workshops and conferences to update their professional knowledge & skills. Many of our faculty members have successfully completed faculty development programmes which included orientation and refresher course. The evaluation process adopted in our college is both formative and summative. The internal examination marks along with the university exam marks put a seal on the final performance of the student. The students are counselled by the expert faculty with regards to examination performance. As for the evaluative reforms, we have introduced CBCS as per the university guidelines from this academic year for F.Y. students and MCQ pattern for S.Y. and T.Y. As a result of learning outcome, our students i.e. who have passed out from our campus are working in various professions like teaching, administrative posts, law, politics, medicine and contributing to national development.



### **Criteria III -Research, Consultancy and Extension**

Though the college is located in tribal and rural area, it has a vibrant research culture. Sticking upto its commitment, Kinwat Shikshan Sanstha has allotted 3.16 acres of its land to the affiliating university to set up tribal research centre which will help in enhanced studies on tribal lives, schemes, policies, socio-economic and socio-cultural background of the tribal lives and enabling them to lead a dignified life. At present, out of 19 faculty members, 09 are Ph.D., 05 are M.Phil and 03 are SET/ NET. 06 faculty member are engaged in their doctoral programmes, 06 faculty members are recognized research supervisors in subjects like Botany, Chemistry, Zoology and commerce . 02 research scholars working under the supervision of Dr. Maqdoom Mohiuddin. The college has recognized research centre in zoology. It is a matter of pride for the college to state that, its faculty members are actively engaged in minor research projects funded by UGC and other agencies. To date, the college has to its credit 06 MRPS completed, 01 ongoing and 04 MRPS are submitted for approval. The college has well equipped and well-furnished library having 32360 numbers of texts and reference books, e-journal, dissertations and thesis, computer and internet facilities are made available to the faculty, research scholars and students for research purpose. We have well equipped science laboratories with LCD projectors and internet to facilitate students, scholars and faculty to pursue their research. The college utilizes the fund received under various UGC schemes to develop and augment research related infrastructure. The department of commerce has signed and MOU with MCED for creating enterprenueral awareness among the students. The college is looking forward to sign more MOUS in future in different branches of knowledge so as to take a research on a new height and bring out socially productive results. In the area of consultancy, the college offers its expert service on water testing, blood group testing free of cost. Being conscious of one's social responsibilities and the debt we owe to the society, our faculty and students are actively engaged in eradicating social evils like caste, creed, sex, poverty , illiteracy, superstition through organizing and participating in programmes with the help of NSS, NCC cultural wing of our college and various external agencies like ANIS.

### **Criteria-IV -Infrastructure and Learning resources**

Kinwat Shikshan Santha, Baliram Patil college has a total area of 20 acres, of which 3.16 acres is allotted to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University for the purpose of building Tribal Research Centre in the name of our founder president late Shri Uttamraoji Rathod. The college has a separate administrative wing with all the necessary facilities and required technology. It has 23 classrooms with requisite furniture and teaching learning resources. Apart from it, we have spacious, physics lab, zoology lab, chemistry lab, maths lab, botany lab and zoology research centre with ICT facility and needed equipments. A spacious computer lab with 15 systems is available with us. Internet, wifi facility is available for the office and almost all the departments in our college. A common waiting room for the girl students with the necessary facilities is one of the important infrastructural features of our college. Apart from this, the college provides different facilities for its students like sports ground, outdoor and indoor facilities, gymnasium, NSS cell, NCC cell, cultural activity cell, anti-sexual harassment cell, anti-ragging cell, career guidance cell, SC/ST cell. A well-furnished canteen with affordable charges is one of the hall marks of our institute. Classified parking in the parking lot free of cost is also available in the college. A fully computerized spacious library of 2700 sq.ft. with separate reading rooms for teachers and students along with internet connectivity is the additional infrastructural feature. The library consists of near about 32360 books and journals, e-resources, Newspapers. It takes special care of the Divyangs (Physically challenged) by locating itself on the ground floor making the access feasible. Ramp service is provided at necessary places. A separate window for the divyangs at the library and office reveals the college commitment towards the special people as part of human resource. We have OPAC system in our library along with N-List. The library operates through the library advisory committee which includes all the stakeholders. The committee takes care of library budget for the purchase of books & journals and resolving grievances pertaining to library. The upkeep and maintenance of infrastructure and other services is taken care of by non-teaching staff and hired technicians.

### **Criteria V – Student support and progression**

We as an educational institute promise ourselves not just to deliver quality education to our students but to provide all allied services that result in student progression. Near about 51% of our students belongs to SC, ST, VJNT and OBC categories and hence college takes special care of the students and scholarships sponsored by the government and other agencies for educational purposes. As a result of efforts put up by





our faculty to bring more number of girl students into higher education, our college enrolls satisfying number of girl student for whom we provide facilities like girls hostel, women Grievance cell, waiting Hall, special NSS unit of 75 girls with a lady programme officer, canteen, sports facilities, library with internet, reading room. For the specially challenged, the college ensures facilities like special toilets, ramp, special window at library and office and free accommodation in the college campus. Apart from these services, the college ensure the holistic development of girls and boys through making them aware about burning social issues like female foeticide, global warming, climate change, terrorism, corruption, water scarcity by organizing special lectures of eminent peoples, staging street plays, holding debate and essay competition, drawing Rangoli on the theme. The college has a career guidance cell which helps the student to seek job prospective and the skills required thereof. In relation to student job prospective, the college has a cell guiding the students for competitive examination like MPSC, UPSC, SET, NET, defence services etc. The students exhibit their creative talent through publishing wall papers on various occasions and writing for the annual college magazine "UNMESH". To inculcate professional and life skills along with moral and ethical values, the college organizes industrial and study tours to places of historical, cultural and scientific importance. The NSS, NCC, sports, cultural cell, Grievance redressal cell of our college takes every possible care to ensure students comfortable academic journey in the campus and organize activities ensuring all round development of the students.

### **Criteria-VI -Governance, Leadership and Management**

Kinwat Shikshan Santha's, Baliram Patil Arts, Commerce and Science College is committed to offer quality education as well as extension services to its stakeholders. The vision, mission and objectives of our college clearly reflect the nature and dedication towards the society, where we live. The IQAC and Principal, being the head of the Institute formulate policies, pertaining to quality enhancement and get them implemented through the Heads of all the departments. Formal and informal meetings between IQAC, Principal, Staff and non-teaching helps in the smooth functioning of the organization. Major decisions pertaining to infrastructure and financial support are conveyed to the LMC which meets twice a year. The Principal, being the member secretary of the Local Management committee (LMC) acts as a link between the staff and management. The Principal is given full autonomy to frame policies and implement them in a democratic manner. The teachers, students and staff members are felicitated and honored as part of motivational drive for the excellent performance in the respective fields. Decisions regarding faculty promotion, Additional Increments, CAS is taken unanimously after discussion in the top management meeting. The Co-curricular and Extracurricular activities are carried out through various college level committees constituted for the purpose. The audit is done by the statutory auditors and also by the Govt. auditors at regular intervals.

The IQAC cell of the college prepares Institutional calendar on the lines of the university calendar for the smooth functioning. The management implements few welfare



schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff. Baliram Patil credit co-operative society, a body of the employees extends loan facilities to its members for various purposes. Feedback from all quarters is obtained through visitors Diary and news report.

### **Criteria VII -Innovations and Best Practices**

Educational institutes are the pillars of innovative ideas and the space where best practices are given birth to. The college constantly works in the direction of establishing novel ideas and best practices in its course of life. These ideas and practices are inculcated through course contents and practical implementation. To inculcate love for nature and to save the planet drives like tree plantation, water harvesting, energy conservation, efforts for carbon neutrality, hazardous waste management, e-waste management, check dam construction etc are carried out. Moreover in order to make the students environment conscious, the college as per the instructions of affiliating university makes the students study environment science as a compulsory subject at BA. B.Com and B.Sc. third year. A project based on environmental consciousness is undertaken and submitted by the students under the supervision of expert faculty which in turn makes students eco- friendly and sensitive towards environmental concerns. Apart from this, the NSS camps and cultural activities performed by our students are the evidences of the steps taken by the college in this direction. During the last 04 years, the college practices certain noble acts, of which two are labelled as best practices which contributed to the quality improvement of the core activity of the college

1. Blood Donation
2. Minimum charge accommodation to students

Keeping in view, the importance of blood in human life the college takes initiative to organize the camp every year on 17th January resulting in saving innumerable lives.

Providing minimum charge accommodation to the boys and girls studying in the tribal college like ours is a practice unique of its own. Since the college is sensitive to the educational needs of the oppressed classes, the institute provides almost free boarding facility without eyeing on profit or income generation

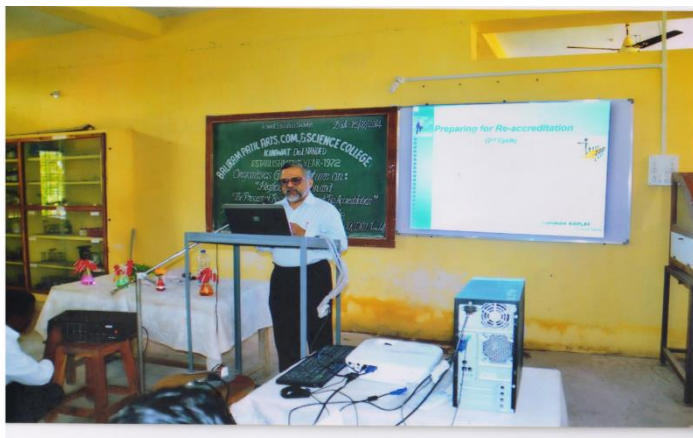

The same is communicated and provided to each departments and are also displayed at the entrance of the college, library and other important places in the campus.





**1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).**

Since the college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded, it follows the curriculum designed by the university. As far as curriculum design is concerned, the college has no autonomy. The IQAC of the college is effective in getting the curriculum implemented with various committees. The syllabus framed for the various courses is considered and committees prepare the action plan to achieve the objectives of the curriculum.

Under IQAC, annual plan and academic calendar is prepared which contains various committees. Routine time-table for syllabus teaching is prepared by time-table committee under the supervision of IQAC. The college provides the blank format of annual teaching plans to each department. In the meeting of HOD's, the heads distribute the teaching papers to the faculty members. Semester wise activity is planned and implemented. Annual teaching plan is prepared at the beginning of semester and accordingly daily teaching plan is written in daily teaching report provided by the institution. Monthly follow-up is taken and in order to fill the gap arising due to teacher absence, additional lectures are arranged on Sunday, holiday or other working days in zero hours according to convenience.

The college strictly follows internal assessments part of formative evaluation. The library of the college plays a vital role in providing the relevant study material, reference books and internet access for the effective implementation of the curriculum.

**1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?**

As part of procedural support for effective translation of curriculum, the principal encourages teachers and sanctions duty leave of the teachers to attend the workshops of based on curriculum.

College provides LCD & ICT facility to the teacher for effective teaching. Teacher's use the LCD projectors as per their need and weightage of the content in the curriculum. All the science departments of our college have their own LCD projectors & they use it as per their need.

The university i.e. board of studies of concerned subjects design curriculum which is subsequently displayed on the university website. In case of restructured and new curriculum, the university with the help of affiliated colleges organizes workshop on curriculum. The teachers of the concern subjects participate in such workshops where in they get innovative ideas

and techniques pertaining to effective delivery of the same to their students. Such workshops help in enriching teaching practices. The library of the college downloads the syllabuses of all the subjects and makes them available to the students and respective departments. The concerned teacher gives the paper wise syllabus to the students. At the end of every semester, feedback is taken orally and manually to check its effective deliverance and the objectives achieved.

The institution has organized workshop in Marathi to have in-depth discussion of the content and policies which are newly introduced to the teachers and students such as MCQ pattern. Being the members of BOS, our staff members take opportunity to have their contribution in framing the syllabus and others academic aspects of the university.

In addition to that, for the effective delivery of the curriculum, the faculty actively participates in workshops, seminars conference and symposia, prepares annual teaching plan, conducts internal exams, holds student seminars, arranges educational tours and provides model questions papers and solutions.

At present Ph.D. supervision is available in subjects like Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Commerce.

**1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?**

Since our college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded, it does not have the option of formulating its own curriculum. The college make sincere effort to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance employment opportunities.

The faculty members of our college are working as BOS members of university. Taking into consideration the suggestion, feedback about syllabus from students, parents, stakeholders, BOS members of our institute are collected which contribute to modify, enrich and design the curriculum.

Our institute organizes various activities during the academic year such as Annual social gathering, cultural activities, sports for the students to develop their skill. The study tour organized by various department result in enhancing the students learning experience outside the classroom. The college has developed language club, so that the students can learn more easily the complex concept of language.

The college organizes welcome function for the fresher's and sendoff functions for the III<sup>rd</sup> year students under the guidance of concerned faculty. The college, organizes expert lectures for the students which enhance their skill and knowledge needed in the dynamic employment market through extension activity. In NSS, NCC the students are imparted personality development skill, values enabling them to be the better citizen of society and nation.

**1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?**

The college takes following measures to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT



### GENDER ISSUES:-

- ❖ The women cell of the college takes care of the women rights both students and staff.
- ❖ The anti-sexual harassment cell spreads awareness among the girl students regarding defensive techniques to avoid sexual harassment. The cell also takes care to prevent sexual harassment at campus. No case has been registered yet.
- ❖ The NSS unit of the college organized various welfare programs for the girls students such as self Defence programme for women (Swayam Siddha), "Jagar Janivancha" programme to sensitize students and society regarding gender and to make them aware of issues like gender equality and female feticide etc.

As a result of these efforts and activities, girl's admissions are increased during 2011-12 to 2015-16

### CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENVIRONMENT EDUCATION:

- ❖ Environmental studies is a compulsory subject for students third year which includes environmental awareness, climate change etc.
- ❖ The college organize NSS camp with the theme "Youth camp for the protection of environment and natural resources " for the last five years in which "Gram Swachata" (Village cleaning) digging of toilet pit (Sochkhadda), plantation is done. In addition to this experts talks were delivered on topics like pollution , water management, awareness about medicinal plants, importance of forest and forest conservation , protection of wild animals.
- ❖ No fuel day is observed on every 15th and 30th day of every month.

### HUMAN RIGHTS:

- ❖ The grievance redressal cell caters to the issues regarding Human Rights violation.





- ❖ Lectures on Human Rights are delivered by Adv. Tauffik Quereshi, Adv. Tajne and Adv. Sable.
- ❖ The syllabus of social science includes the topic on Human Rights. Various lectures are organized to create awareness about human rights.

**ICT :**

- ❖ Technology is put into maximum use in the teaching learning process. Our e- classrooms with LCD projector makes teaching sessions more interactive and help effective time management. Similarly our laboratories and library are e-enabled. The college provides OPAC facility for the students in the library. N- List / INFLIBINET facility is available in the central library. Wi-Fi facility is available on campus.

**1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?**

- § Moral and ethical values
- § Employable and life skills
- § Better career options
- § Community orientation

Though the value added course / enrichment programme as such are not offered, however for the holistic development of the students the college offers :

1. Environmental studies which is compulsory for BA / B.Sc / B.Com Third year students.
2. Moral and ethical values are inculcated among the students through speeches on different occasions and events.
3. Employable and life skills.
4. Guest lecturers conducted for MBA / MCA/ entrance preparation.
5. Community orientation through NSS, NCC, Socio-cultural activities.
6. Financial literacy programme.
7. Social skills are developed through cultural programme, practical and projects performed in groups.
8. Professional skills of the students are developed through field visits, industrial visits and study tours.

**1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?**

Formal and informal feedback is collected from student's parents, alumni and other stakeholders on the effectiveness of the curriculum. The feedback thus collected is taken into consideration in making necessary changes in providing quality education.

Feedback is also obtained informally from the visitors and guest faculties.

The same is communicated through IQAC to the BOS member's in order to make necessary changes and the BOS members escalate it to the academic council.

### 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programme through principal, vice-principal, IQAC, heads of the departments and coordinators of concerned working departments.

- ❖ DTR and attendance are kept updated.
- ❖ Student's feedback mechanisms are maintained.
- ❖ Unit tests, tutorials, seminars, project reports.
- ❖ Effective implementation of faculty development programme.
- ❖ Organizing student - teachers meetings and parent- teacher meetings.

## 1.4 Feedback System

### 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Since the college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded the college has to adopt the curriculum prescribed by Parent University. However feedback on curriculum from students, teachers and other stakeholders are registered and forwarded to the BOS members of the college for necessary action.

The college, through its BOS members from various subjects, Dr. S.K. Bembrekar (Botany), Dr. Maqdoom Mohiyuddin (Zoology), U.G. Ingole (Mathematics), R.R. Taur (Marathi), Dr. K.G. Karamunge (Chemistry) contributes in the design and development of curriculum prepared by the university.

Yes, there is a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum.

- ❖ Feedback forms are collected from students and stakeholders and dually analyzed by committee.
- ❖ The BOS members forward the suggestions and opinions recorded by the stakeholders to the university.
- ❖ At college level, the principal along with, IQAC and the staff members discuss and take necessary action.

**1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)**

Unfortunately due to tribal and rural background of the college, it did not introduce any new programme / course in the last four years. The college is planning to design and run new certificate courses and professional courses which will develop life skills and professional skills among the students that in turn help them to get employment and compete with the global markets.

## 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

### 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

#### I) Publicity of admission process:

##### a) Prospectus:

- ❖ In the beginning of academic year, the College prepares updated prospectus which provides detailed information about the college regarding the courses offered and infrastructural facilities.
- ❖ It also provides intake capacity, eligibility criteria for admission to each course, fee structure, documents necessary for the admission, etc.
- ❖ It also give the subject combinations for three years B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com. Courses.
- ❖ The prospectus also provides detailed information about academic as well as support facilities, the academic calendar, rules and regulations.

##### b) Advertisement:

- ❖ Advertisement is being done through pamphlets, flexes at main roads, mouth publicity by our students, Alumni and faculty members & non- teaching staff. Sometimes, our faculties visits to nearby villages and make aware the students about various programmes and the importance of the education.

##### c) College Website:

- ❖ In addition to issuing of prospectus, the college has developed its website: <http://www.bpcollegekinwat.in> for the convenience of students and parents. The website contains all the information mentioned in the prospectus as well as bio-data of faculty. It is updated by new information & changes if any.

##### d) Print media:

- ❖ The College regularly publishes advertisements about admissions in local TV channel and Advertisements on admission to UG programmes are published in the leading regional newspapers.

#### II) Transparency in admission process:

- ❖ The College follows all the norms for admission laid down by Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded and Government of Maharashtra. It follows the guidelines regarding reservation to the backward classes. In order to ensure transparency, the merit list is displayed on notice board and ample time is given to get admission. The closing date of admission as per University guidelines is also displayed. In this way, the College ensures transparency in the admission process.

- ❖ It is significant to note that the college does not accept any donations for admission. Any eligible student can walk in and submit his application for admission. The admission procedure and eligibility criteria are made known to all prospective students.
- ❖ Alumni actively help the prospective students in giving information about college and admission process.

**2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.**

The rule and regulations regarding reservations laid down by the University / State Government are strictly followed by the college in admission process. The college also maintains reservation criterion method as per govt. norms.

**Admission to UG:**

- ❖ For UG Courses, admissions are given first come first serve. Separate admission committee is formed by the College for UG courses. The committee guides the students about the registration and admission process.
- ❖ It also provides information about the courses offered by the College. After Completion of registration process, check list is displayed on notice board.
- ❖ Identity Card is issued soon after admission

**2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.**

The selection of the students of B. A., B. Com. and B.Sc.is made on the basis of SRTM University, Nanded. We give admission to all the students those who pass in 12th class. The following chart enumerates the point more clearly.

**2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?**

The institution has a mechanism to review the admission process & student profile annually. The admission committee informs the office about the following information of the students.

- i) Gender representation
  - ii) Economic status
  - iii) Academic background
  - iv) Curricular / Extracurricular Activities
  - v) Level of disability
- ❖ Review of the admission process and the subsequent analysis of the student profile help in providing equal representation from all section of the society. The record of their performance in all the fields, academic as well as extracurricular is maintained by the concerning departments.
  - ❖ The students with a little bit negative approach are motivated with counseling so that a positive frame of mind can be developed. This results in making students an asset for the institution.
  - ❖ The college takes a review of the students admitted in each course. The maximum intake for each Course at UG level is 120 students. Admissions to UG classes are reaching to the maximum intake. When the admission reach to the maximum the college makes the efforts to increase the intake capacity. As per the University norms, college get 10% extra seats. . College maintains group wise balance of students. Reservation policy is strictly followed
  - ❖ After the admission process is completed, the Principal takes a review of the admission procedure from teaching and non-teaching staff. If any difficulties in admission procedure are reported either by teaching or non-teaching staff, they are resolved in the next year.
  - ❖ The individual departments monitor the progress of students by maintaining student's profile. Thus slow learners and advanced learners are identified.

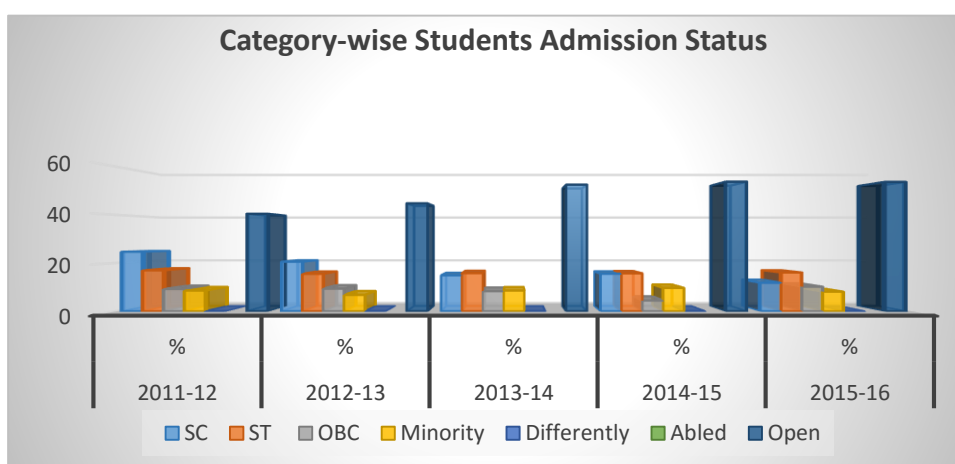

### a. Students from disadvantaged community (SC/ST/OBC):

- ❖ There is reservation for students belonging to disadvantaged community as per Govt. of Maharashtra notifications.
- ❖ The college takes every care to ensure the reservations meant for disadvantaged community every year. Category wise lists of students are displayed and admission is given. If the seats remain vacant, students from other category are admitted.
- ❖ As the students for SC, ST & OBC category get their tuition fees from the government, at time of admission, college takes minimum fees excluding tuition fees from these students, so that these students get attracted for admission and their strength gets increased. In critical cases, the college level fee is excused.
- ❖ Women: Financial concession is given in admission and hostel fees to girls students. The positive impact of this is apparent from the high number of women students both in the courses of study and in the hostels run by the College.
- ❖ The following table shows the number of students admitted in the college during the last four years and their percentage in total admissions.

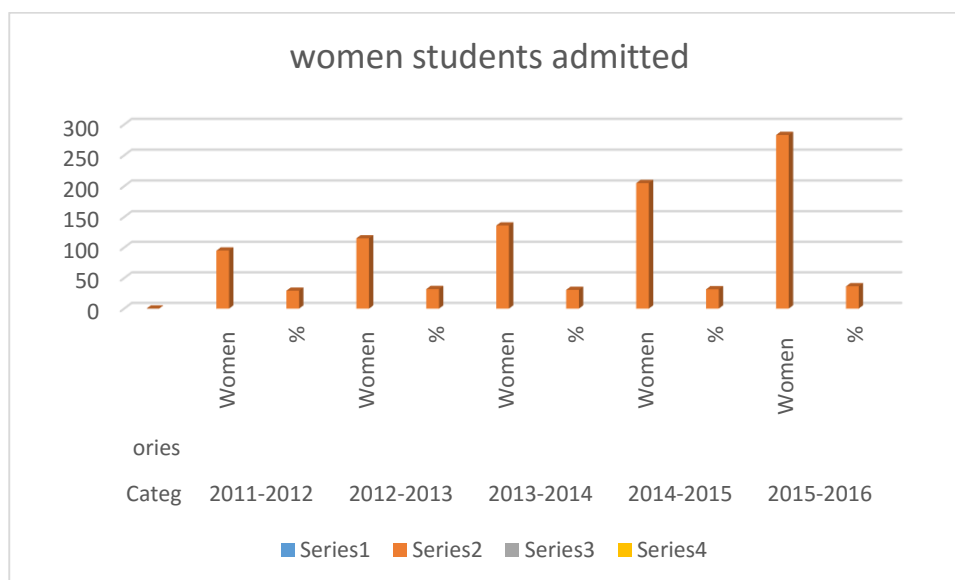

- ❖ There is reservation for students coming from minority community and are also eligible for scholarships from the government. So these students from minority community are informed about the scholarship and guided to apply for scholarship.

**f) Any Other:**

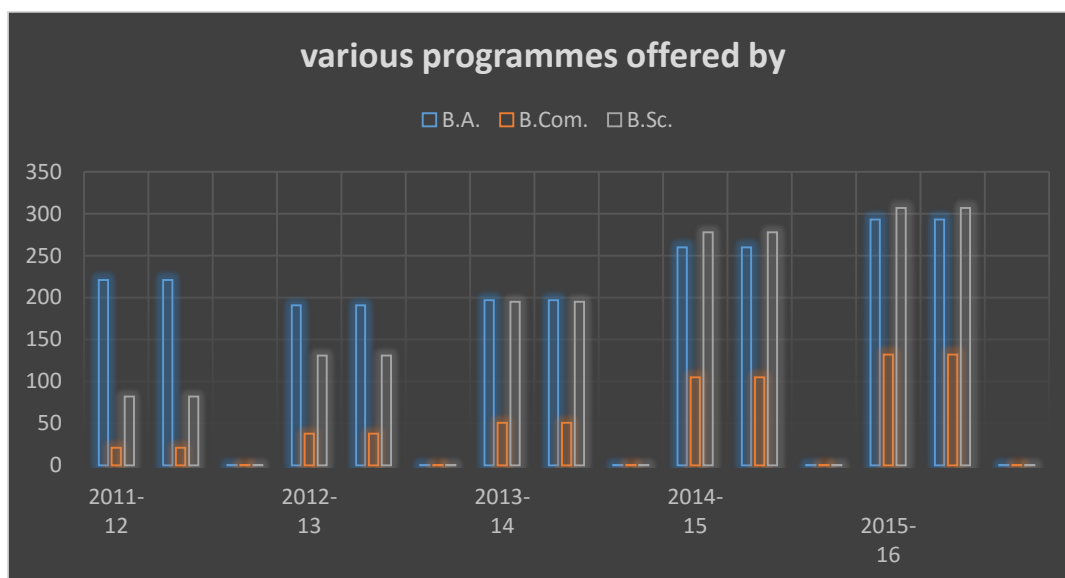
- ❖ Students are admitted preferentially in all course based upon the excellence of the students in athletics or sports activities at regional or national level. The sports teacher is always in touch with the students who have participated in sports activities from the different institutions at +2 stage and he takes the efforts to see that the sports students are admitted in college.

### Reasons for increase / decrease of demand ratio

- ❖ The more / less scope for placement is the reason for the increase / decrease in demand for the UG, programmes is due to the interest of students and their parents in D.Ed. programme which is the minimum qualification to become a teacher leading to life settlement.
- ❖ Counseling for the UG students regarding the availability of diverse job opportunities.

## 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

### 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- ❖ As per the Government norms, seats are reserved for differently abled students. The college implements schemes of Government of Maharashtra and U.G.C. for their benefit.
- ❖ The college also gives priority to the above mentioned classes of students in the admission to the hostel.
- ❖ These students are encouraged at every level in the institution. Such students are also given half an hour extra time in the terminal and final examination.

### 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The student is assessed at the time of admission on the basis of marks at entry level, computer literacy, communication skills, etc. by the panel



of teachers. The subject teachers also assess the knowledge and skills of the students through interaction and discussion with them. It is expected that this analysis and the performance of students at qualifying examinations are likely to create a base for monitoring the future progress of students.

**2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?**

Through class room interaction and discussion with students, the teacher identifies slow learners (students having knowledge gap) initially. Such students are also identified on the following criteria

- ❖ Students coming from other branches of knowledge.
- ❖ Students having more than one mark- memo.
- ❖ Students securing less mark in unit tests and university examination.
- ❖ Students who are irregular.

To bridge the knowledge gap, the teachers make the students to revise and recall their knowledge gained in previous classes. For this extra classes are conducted. Remedial coaching classes are also arranged for the weaker students.

**2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?**

The college has formed a Women Cell. The purpose and function of Women Cell is to facilitate a gender-sensitive and congenial working environment at college so that women and students at work place are not subjected to gender specific discrimination or sexual harassment. To our belief HARASSMENT constitute any unwelcome sexually determined behavior (physical, verbal or any other form) which violates the womens dignity and interferes with her ability to operate freely at work. Harassment would also include gender based discriminatory behavior. Any women employee academic/ non-academic (including contractual, casual and temporary) or female student of B. P. College Kinwat can approach the cell. The person concerned can personally approach / telephone / write/ e-mail any member of the Cell. Alternatively, e-mail can be sent to the Principal B. P. College Kinwat. The name of the complainant is kept secret.

**Gender Sensitivity**

Following programs are under taken for gender awareness.

- ❖ Facilities to women students like construction of women's hostel, ladies common room, separate vehicle parking.
- ❖ Programmes conducted especially to educate women about career

opportunities, legal and social rights.

- ❖ Medical checkup camps for women students.
- ❖ Facilities to women sports students.
- ❖ Organized seminar, Jagar Janiv, Yuti Shabha Rally for women empowerment and upliftment.

### Environment

The following programs are undertaken by the college relating to creation of environment awareness.

- ❖ Students are motivated to keep a clean and litter-free environment in their class rooms and laboratories in particular, and around the campus in general. Dustbins/Litter-bins are kept at strategically located places within the college campus
- ❖ In order to make students conscious about their responsibility towards the environment, they are advised to save electricity by switch off the lights and fans while leaving the classrooms and laboratories.
- ❖ In support of conservation of nature the college also implements the healthy practices such as, No Vehicle Day on the 15th and 30th day of every month.
- ❖ Environmental Day is also celebrated
- ❖ Environment awareness rallies organized.
- ❖ Environment as a subject is included in the curriculum of final year classes and assigned compulsorily as a part of Project Work.

### Inclusivity

- ❖ Value added education lectures are arranged for all the college students, through which they are sensitized on various issues such as the importance of education for the weaker sections and combating social evils. They are motivated to acquire an inclusive attitude towards one and all. The twin values of equality and brotherhood are inculcated in them.
- ❖ Celebration of Birth Anniversaries of eminent personalities such as Shivaji Maharaj, Swami Vivekananda, Savitribai Phule, Dr. Sarvapalli Radhakrishnan, Dr.B.R.Ambedkar etc., also motivates the students and staff to imbibe the great qualities of these eminent personalities which in itself would help in sensitizing and creation of awareness of harmonic co-existence.
- ❖ Through various capacity-building strategies students are involved in issues affecting society. NCC and NSS students are sensitized about these issues during the camps.

### Advanced Learners

- ❖ Felicitations of advanced students by the college so as to motivate them and

sustain their level and also to motivate the other students.

- ❖ Promoted for competitions organized at different places
- ❖ Provide the additional training aids such as additional library books and extended hour in the laboratories and also provide special coaching.

#### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The teacher identifies the advanced learners through their performance in previous examination and through interaction with them. The advanced learners are also identified on the basis of performance in internal and University examinations. Such active students are selected.

The institution adopts following strategies for facilitating advanced learners:

- ❖ Felicitation of meritorious students in Annual Social Gathering.
- ❖ By encouraging advanced learners to participate in various curricular and co-curricular activities; such as seminars, group discussions, quiz competitions, etc.
- ❖ Steps to enhance their communication skills, art of reading – learning/and inculcate reading habit.
- ❖ By organizing interaction with alumni pursuing higher education as well as those holding higher positions.

The teacher identifies the advanced learners on the following criteria:

- a) Students who had secured more than 60% marks in the previous examination.
- b) Students who secure more than 60% of marks in the unit tests.
- c) Students who demand books of different authors and study material from time to time.

#### 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

After declaration of results by the University, results of every class and all subjects are analyzed. The students who are failed are advised to apply for supplementary examination. Counseling is done by the senior teachers. The institution gives the facility to borrow the necessary books from the library. Remedial classes are arranged for unsuccessful students to improve their performance, so as to minimize the drop- out rate. Every care is taken so that he or she should not be thrown out of the stream. The faculty contacts with the



parents of students showing low performance. The faculty collect the data of absent student, and are counseled and care is taken to improve their performance.

## 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

### 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Academic Calendar of College is planned every year by the IQAC. While preparing the Academic Calendar, the committee takes into account, the academic calendar prepared by the university. Academic Calendar of College is included in the college prospectus that is printed every year.

Academic Calendar of college is mainly based on two important provisions. They are as follows:

- ❖ The university specifies the frame work for academic schedule – Teaching, Learning and Evaluation (TLE). It includes number of semesters, working/teaching days, number of subjects – papers to be taught, teaching hours per theory paper or practical, semester-end examinations and method of assessment and declaration of results. The detailed syllabus for all the subjects is prescribed by the University.
- ❖ The Internal Examination Committee prepares the schedule for internal examinations (Examination schedule, evaluation schedule, etc).Based on these provisions, teaching, learning and evaluation schedule of the College is planned, organized and informed to the HODs for implementation.
- ❖ The monthly meeting is conducted in which teaching plan for each paper is prepared. These meetings are conducted at regular intervals to discuss the completion of syllabus as per teaching plan.
- ❖ Extra periods are made available on Sundays to complete the syllabus as per academic calendar.
- ❖ Thus, the systematic step provides, in advance, the information about teaching, learning and evaluation to all stakeholders. Students get information about the Academic programme i.e. teaching days, learning days, components to be learnt, schedule of internal examinations and evaluation process. Teachers get information about the time frame for teaching – learning process and ensure the total attention for the completion of syllabi and possible revision.

### Dates of Academic and personal duties

- ❖ The teaching plan is submitted to the office of vice principal first week of each month as well as entered in the diary provided to the teachers.

### Academic Diary:

- ❖ The teachers have to maintain the Academic Diary wherein period-wise academic delivery has to be mentioned. It is monitored by the Principal

### Evaluation Blue Print:

- ❖ Question papers and practical examination patterns and scheme of marking are explained to the students in the beginning of the academic year.
- ❖ The examination time-table as per the schedule fixed by the University is displayed more than a month in advance on the notice boards for the information of the students. The university also displays links on its website in advance.
- ❖ The examinations are conducted as per the schedule and the centralized evaluation of the answer papers is organized by university.
- ❖ After examinations, a process of assessment for the first and second year students is scheduled with internal teachers, while the T.Y. papers go through the assessment process as per university central assessment programme.
- ❖ Students also have recourse to reevaluate their answer papers which is handled by an external examiner in the form of redressal at university level.
- ❖ Evaluation of tutorials, and unit tests and papers of internal examination is done immediately after the submission of papers.
- ❖ Marks of tutorials, unit tests and internal examination are considered for judging the performance of student throughout the year.

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching -learning process?

The IQAC conducts the meeting at regular intervals. It communicates its plans and perspectives to all the stakeholders. It collects the record time to time and maintains the document evidences. IQAC also collects and analyses feedback from students, alumni and parents.

The measures taken by IQAC in quality enhancement and to improve the teaching -learning process are as follows:

- ❖ To prepare academic calendar.
- ❖ To analyses the University examination results at the beginning of the academic year and to decide the measures required for improvement of the results.
- ❖ To encourage the staff to attend conferences, seminars, workshops, teachers training programmes, so as to get their knowledge updated.
- ❖ To motivate the staff to undertake major and minor research projects.
- ❖ To encourage the students for their involvement in cultural, scientific and

social activities.

- ❖ To obtain feedback from the students regarding teaching-learning process as well as infrastructural facilities.
- ❖ To consider the improvements suggested by the students regarding teaching learning process, library facilities, sports, ICT Class Room, laboratory facilities, hostels or any other facilities and to take measures for their implementation.

**2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?**

The college has provided the following support structures and systems to develop skills of the teachers like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students:

**1. Interactive learning:** - Students seminars and group discussions are arranged. For seminars, all the audio visual aids like Computers, Laptops, LCD-Projectors and other teaching aids are made available to the students.

**2. Collaborative learning:** - The educational tours, excursions, visits to research centers, industrial units and university departments are arranged every year. The students and the teachers are benefited with this collaborative learning experience. The interaction between office bearers, employees of these centers and our students and teachers derive proper output. The students are highly inspired and curious about collaborative learning experience.

**3. Independent learning:** -The B.Sc. III year students undertake project work for Environmental Studies in addition to this; in house research projects are also undertaken. The project work is aimed at independent learning by students. The students are encouraged to participate in university level research festival "Avishkar". The activities like presentation of seminars, completion of home assignments etc. are also helpful in development of independent learning skill among the students.

**2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?**

The College has provided a good infrastructure facility to the students. All the Departments have well-equipped laboratories. On holidays, laboratories are available for the students, if needed.

- ❖ The Science students prepare posters on scientific aspects and the posters are displayed on notice board.



- ❖ Study tours and field visits are also organized by different departments for the students
- ❖ Cultural Literacy motivates the students to participate in University level youth festival.
- ❖ The students are encouraged to write articles for the college magazine "UNMESH".
- ❖ All these efforts transform the students into life-long learners and innovators.

**2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.**

The college is quite aware about the use of modern teaching aids. Most of the department in the college has been provided with the facilities namely computers, printers, internet connection, and LCD projector.

The teachers use all these facilities in their teaching-learning programme. Our faculty is now more dependent on e-content freely available on Internet. The faculty members make use of educational CDs, UGC programmes, Discovery, National Geographic, Animal Planet, Documentaries for effective teaching learning process.

**2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?**

The college and SRTMU Nanded organize a one day Workshop of Marathi on 13 Jan.2015 for the teachers to enable them to keep abreast of recent developments.

The internet is primarily used by the faculty as well as students for up gradation of knowledge. In addition to this, the recent trends in all subjects are available in journals, magazines, periodicals and newspapers, which are readily available in the central library of the College. The students and faculty have access to this information constantly.

The teachers are motivated to attend seminars, conferences, workshops and also deputed to attend orientation and refresher programmes. In this way, faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills.

**2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?**

The college provides to students the following academic, personal, psycho-social support and guidance services:

**Professional counseling:**

- ❖ The College has a Career Guidance Cell. It guides about job opportunities. Kinwat Shikshan Sanstha's has established a Competitive Examinations Guidance Cell for students for the preparation of UPSC and MPSC examinations.

**Mentoring:**

- ❖ The teachers also play a role of guardians and mentors of students. They guide the students properly on personal level. It establishes rapport among the students and teachers.

**Academic advice:**

- ❖ Occasionally, the students receive academic advice at the time of inaugural functions of the various committees. The dignitaries having academic aptitude, the authorities from the universities and educationalists from the region are invited to extend academic advice to our students. The students are informed about advanced courses, like PG courses in different subjects time to time. They are also informed about web-site of higher educational institutes such as ICAR, NCL, TIFR, and BARC. Alumni on higher post are invited for academic advice.

Since technology has emerged in every field of life, it has a revolutionary impact on teaching methods. **2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching- learning process?**

The college has well-equipped central library. It contains 32360 books,

journals and periodicals, 09 newspapers. UGC recommended Soul 2.0 Library Automation Software (INFLIBNET, Ahmedabad) is installed in the library. Various facilities are made available to augment the teaching learning process. The Library plays vital role in the process of education and provides with text books, periodicals/ journals & newspapers for the renders, every enrolled student is the member of Library.

The students are allowed to borrow the books twice in week. Each student is allowed to borrow two books at a time. The complete set of books is given to physically disabled students.

- ❖ The College has subscribed for INFLIB-NET N- list, through which more than 1,38,500 e-books and 6300 e-journals are made available to the faculty members and students
- ❖ The library has a reading room with seating capacity of 40 students
- ❖ The library maintained user friendly atmosphere providing polite services.
- ❖ Faculty members also individually have good collection of books & Journals.

**2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.**

Yes. The college faces many challenges in completing the curriculum within the timeframe.

**Challenges:**

- ❖ Strikes and Bandh declared by various organizations
- ❖ Due to unforeseen and unavoidable situations like National/State elections.
- ❖ Unscheduled extracurricular activities,

**Measures adopted to overcome these challenges:**

- ❖ Commencement of courses irrespective of results.
- ❖ By arranging extra lectures in zero hours and holidays.

**2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?**

The teaching learning process is monitored and evaluated by the IQAC, Principal and Vice-Principal of the College.

- ❖ The quality of teaching and learning is also assessed on the basis of the





results of the subjects. At the end of every semester, the results of each subject and every paper are scrutinized and if the results are not satisfactory, it is communicated to the teacher and asked to improve the results next time.

- ❖ There is a formal system for the monitoring and evaluation of the quality of teaching learning. The IQAC conduct meeting and instruct the staff. Sometimes the Principal and Vice-Principal take rounds to the classrooms and laboratories to monitor and supervise the process. It yields positive output by the firsthand knowledge of them.
- ❖ Sometimes the Principal and Vice-Principal also attend the lectures at the class rooms to evaluate and assess the status of teaching learning process.
- ❖ They advise the teachers to make amends and improvements of the short comings in the teaching learning process.
- ❖ Students' feedback is taken and suggestions are invited from the students regarding their expectations from the teachers.

## 2.4 Teacher Quality

### 2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The College is an aided College. It follows the norms of recruitment of teachers given by University Grants Commission and Government of Maharashtra. The policy of recruitment is as follows:

- ❖ The policy of recruitment is transparent.
- ❖ During recruitment of staff, the College advertises the vacancies of posts in some national and state level newspapers and also on the web-site of College and University.
- ❖ After getting application from the candidates, these are scrutinized.
- ❖ Thereafter the College demands the selection committee from S.R.T.M. University.
- ❖ The selection committee comprises the management members, Principal, Government nominee, Vice-Chancellor nominee, two subject experts and head of the department of concerned subject.
- ❖ The eligible candidates are called for interview.
- ❖ The selection committee conducts the interview as per the guidelines of the University and selects the most eligible candidates.
- ❖ List of selected candidates is displayed on the website of the college.

- ❖ The selected candidates are given their appointment letter and their approval is sought from the University.
- ❖ Norms regarding eligibility and reservation are strictly followed.

**b) Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning**

**❖ Teaching learning methods/approaches**

- The College motivates the teachers to prepare computer-aided teaching-learning materials by providing various tools and technologies.



- The College supports the process of teaching learning by providing adequate infrastructural facilities.
- Department of Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, physics, Computer Science and Languages have computer based teaching and LCD. All other departments share an ICT room which is used for teaching learning process.

❖ **Handling new curriculum**

- We have experienced and qualified staff to handle the new curriculum with ease. Whenever there is change in the syllabus initiated by the University, the same is conveyed to the HODs by the Principal in time. The HODs call meeting of all the teachers in the Department and discussion is made regarding strategies to empower the teachers to handle the new syllabus effectively.

❖ **Content/knowledge management**

- The teachers of our college are given free access to internet. This helps them to collect enrichment material from the internet. The college has a well-developed library which contains 42185 books of various subjects and journals and periodicals. In addition to this, college has subscribed for INFLIB-NET N- list, through which more than 30, 00,000 e-books and 6,000 e-journals are made available to the faculty members. The faculty also uses charts, flow charts, models and manuals in laboratory experiments. The staff is motivated to prepare computer- aided teaching learning materials.

❖ **Selection, development and use of enrichment materials**

- College organizes workshops on syllabus. Faculties are encouraged to attend the workshops on syllabus. Free access facility to the teacher for e-Journals through the INFLIB-NET also plays very significant role in this regard. The tools and technologies are purchased and provided them as per the requirement of new syllabus. The software like MATLAB, INFLIB-NET, SPSS are also made available to faculties.

❖ **Assessment**

- Before the confirmation of teacher, the overall assessment of the teacher is discussed in the meeting of Local Management Committee (LMC). The Principal also maintains the Academic Confidential Report (ACR) of all the teachers, which records the annual performance of the teachers.
- The following criteria are used for assessment of teachers:



- Self-Assessment Report by the teachers.
- Participation in the co-curricular and extension activities by the teacher.
- Participation in the seminars, conferences, workshops.
- Attending orientation and refresher courses in due time.
- Undertaking research projects and publication of research papers.
- Performing the assigned duties promptly.
- Feedback from the students.

#### ❖ Cross cutting issues

- The cross cutting issues like gender, climate change, environment education, ICT are given much attention. The experts from above mentioned fields are invited to share and deliver their experiences and knowledge.
- Women Cell of college regularly organize guest lectures on issues like women empowerment, female feticide, etc.
- Through N.C.C. and N.S.S., various activities for awareness towards environmental issues are organized.
- The College has made available the latest technology (ICT) for delivering their seminars, which can help them to get aware of recent technologies. It also creates interest in teaching and learning.

#### ❖ Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

- College has provided computers with internet browsing facility to most of the department member for the preparation of teaching-learning materials. Currently, the college has built an ICT classroom.

#### ❖ OER's

- The other OER's (Open Educational Resources) are library software, Research journals, educational CDs, software's, which are helpful to the teachers to get advanced knowledge in their subjects.
- The college has subscribed for INFLIB-NET N- list, through which more than 138500 e-books and 6,300 e-journals are made available to the faculty members.

#### ❖ Teaching learning material development, selection and use

- All the staff members always help to provide the notes, softcopy of teaching learning materials, Question bank when required.
- The teachers are given free access to internet. This helps them

collect learning material from the internet.

- The College has a well-developed library which contains 32360 reference books and journals and periodicals. Educational CDs are also available for the staff.
- These resources are used by the teachers for preparation of teaching learning material.
- Need based assistance is offered by the faculty from Computer Science Department. Some Department conducts Computer Training programmes for both teaching and non-teaching faculty.

Apart from above, UGC have offered grant for Minor research projects to teachers.
- ❖ The faculty is always motivated to attend seminars, conferences and workshops. They are also encouraged to participate orientation and refresher courses.

Yes, the IQAC gets the evaluation of the teachers done by students and external peers. The IQAC takes oral feedback of the teachers from the students and their guardians. At the end of every academic year students give feedback of individual faculty members based on their teaching skills in the prescribed format. If any faculty or Department doesn't meet the benchmark on feedback, they are counseled by the Principal for improvement in teaching skills and results. The IQAC also monitors the teaching methodology by CCTV cameras.

Quality of the teaching - learning process is evaluated by using following criteria:

1. Feedback from parents obtained by Faculty members.
2. Feedback from student through suggestion box and feedback form.
3. Result analysis.
4. Oral Feedback from students and parents.

## **2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**

**2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?**

- ❖ The College makes attempts to care that all the Stakeholders i.e. students and faculty members and even the parents of the students are informed about evaluation process.
- ❖ Guidelines about evaluation process given by the university are communicated to the students in the classrooms and copy of the same is also displayed on the students' notice-board.
- ❖ At the start of the semester, students are informed regarding the pattern of internal as well as semester end examinations and also evaluation system. Students are clearly made aware of the eligibility conditions required to appear in the final examination.
- ❖ Internal examinations are conducted as per the schedule. Immediately after the examination, answer sheets are evaluated and assessed. Answer books are distributed in classroom and students are informed about their mistakes and given suggestions for their better performance.
- ❖ Their doubts, if any, are cleared. The mark lists of individual internal

examinations as well as consolidated marks of both the examinations are displayed on students' notice board. Practice examination for practical evaluation is also conducted by all the departments.

- ❖ A record of University examination result is maintained in the college office. Record of internal examination result is also maintained in the Examination Cell.
- ❖ These registers are scrutinized by the respective faculty to take appropriate measures to improve the performance of the students.
- ❖ The performance of the students in the internal examination is conveyed to their parents by Faculty.
- ❖ Management is also very keen about examination results. The results are discussed at the start of each academic year in the meeting of Local Management Committee.

**2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?**

**I) Evaluation reforms of University:**

- ❖ Two internal examinations are conducted.
- ❖ Multiple choice questions (MCQ) type tests.
- ❖ Completion of project for Environmental sciences.
- ❖ Additional improvement examination for theory and practical's.
- ❖ Flying squad for B.Sc practical examination and evaluation report submitted by members.

**II) Evaluation reforms of College:**

- ❖ Schedule of internal examination is displayed in advance.
- ❖ Each department sets its Unit tests, internal examination, and Question papers.
- ❖ Exam cell works on the model of university exam section. Time table for exam duties is followed.

**2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?**

- ❖ The evaluation reforms of the university are followed by the college. The evaluation is all fair. The students are shown their assessed answer sheets. Any doubt about evaluation is made clear to the students and hence they get satisfied by the evaluation process.
- ❖ All record of examination i.e. answer sheets, mark lists is maintained in the Examination Cell of the College.
- ❖ The students are encouraged and consulted for better performance in the



future examinations.

- ❖ The University has implemented multiple choice question system for the evaluation of students. The college also conducts multiple choice question based practice examination for the students.

**2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.**

The evaluation reforms of the University are followed by the College. For bringing out some improvement among students, the College adopts formative and summative methods of evaluation.

- ❖ In the formative evaluation, two internal examinations are conducted. Each examination is having weight age of 30 marks for each subject. After completion of both the internal examinations, marks are consolidated and converted in to weight age of 10/20 marks. These marks are sent to university.
- ❖ Summative evaluation is carried out by university. For this the marks of university examination are considered. This evaluation is carried out by the examiners appointed by the university.

**2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.**

In this pattern, students can solve multiple choice questions as well as descriptive questions. The topper students (advanced learners) are given advanced coaching and the failed students (weaker learners) are given remedial coaching

**2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?**

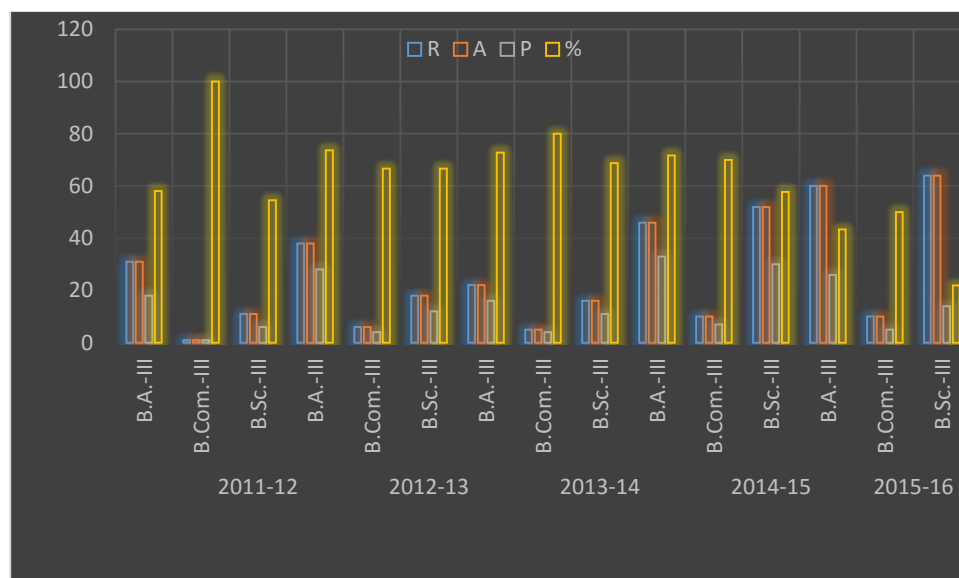
The internal examinations are conducted by the college. The time-table of the internal examination is displayed in advance. The time-table is rigorously followed. The concerned teacher declares the result of the test and shows the answer books to students in the class-room. Their doubts, if any, are cleared. After completion of second internal examination, marks of both the examinations are consolidated and displayed on students' notice board. After declaration of results by the university, the results are displayed on the notice board. The performance of the students in each examination is conveyed to their parents

by the Faculty.

When the MCQ pattern was introduced, results were very poor since the pattern was new for the students. When faculty started communicating, the result and performance of students to their parents, the parents became aware about performance of their son/daughter. Because of this, there was increase in the result of the students.

#### 2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

##### Redressal of grievance at college level:

- ❖ Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. During class teaching, there is face-to-face communication between teachers and students. In science stream, all the subjects have practical paper. During practical also, there is face-to-face communication, during which performance, behavior and overall subject knowledge of the students are observed by the teachers. These characteristics are considered for evaluation during practical examinations. The NCC, NSS and Sports students are also given due advantages in assessment.

##### Redressal of grievance at University level:

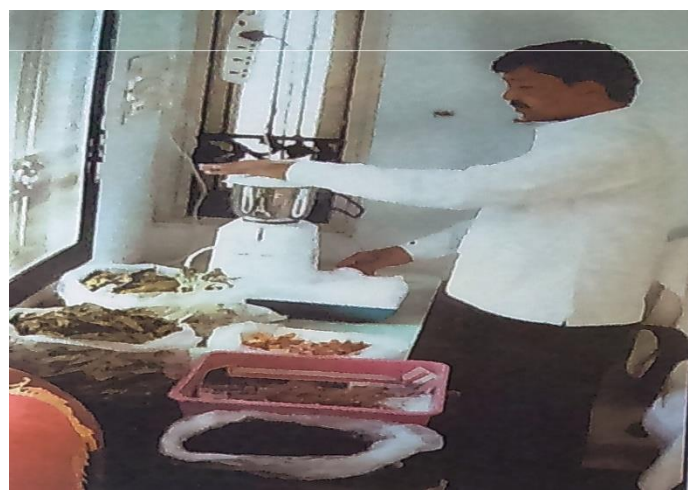

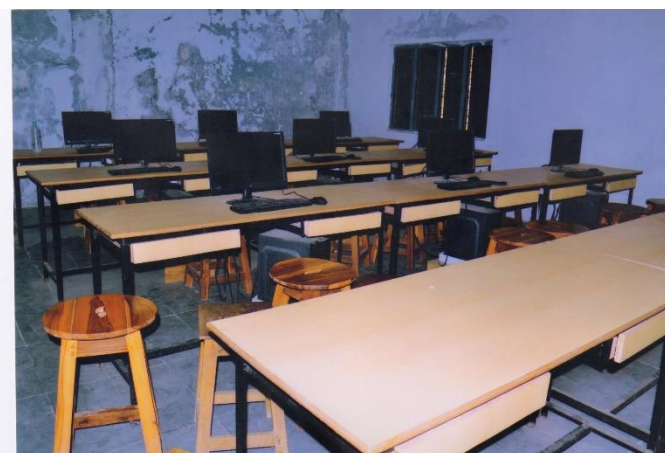

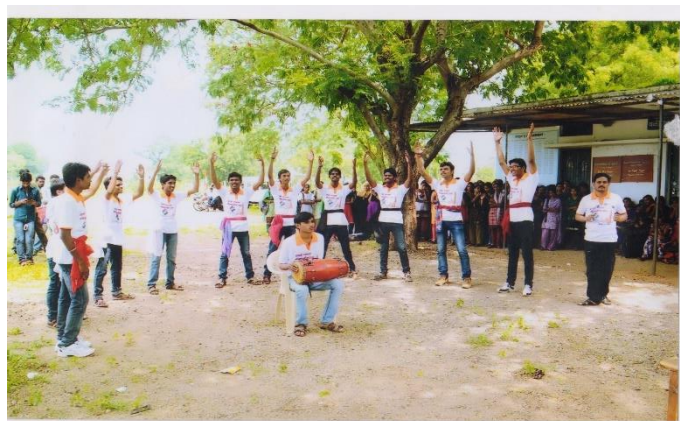

- ❖ The college has appointed teachers from the staff as nodal officers to look after the needs of students who belong to SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections of the society.
- ❖ The nodal officers arrange the meetings of the students at the beginning of the year. They provide all type of information like types of scholarships available, its eligibility criteria, how to fill the forms. They also guide to the students in obtaining various certificates which are needed for the scholarships. The scholarships received from the governments are distributed to them without any delay.
- ❖ The college has UGC sponsored Remedial Coaching Classes, Coaching for Competitive Examinations and Entry in services especially for SC and ST students

##### ❖ Students with physical disabilities

- ❖ The College has established a cell for HEPSN (Higher Education for Persons with Special Needs). The cell arranges counseling, seminars, workshops, etc. for the students with physical disabilities. The cell organizes medical checkup camps for students with special needs. The cell looks after their physical convenience in the college premises. The cell has distributed equipments to the physically disabled student and financial assistance by the institution.

##### ❖ Overseas students

- ❖ There are no overseas students in the college.

- ❖ The college has established a carrier counseling and placement cell. The cell publishes and informs the students regarding the various competitive examinations. It also guides them how to fill the forms. The Cell provides the information regarding the nature of services, books available in the library and other resources available.

- ❖ The college arranges special medical checkup camps during the first and second semester with the help of local doctors.

The students who register their names with the cell are allowed to borrow additional books for preparation of the examination. The college conducts exams on regular basis to make them aware for competitive examination. The cell also arranges lectures of experts, successful candidates for guidance of the students.

The marginalization and deprivation is double if a student is from the backward or scheduled castes. The main objective of this scheme is to develop a critical mind, self-confidence and a commitment to society. The students are given training in health, law, and social activities. They are also given training in self-employment and all possible other activities that enhance her social confidence.

**NSS:**

The goal of N.S.S. is education through Community Service. The purpose is to enrich the student's personality & deepen his understanding of the social environment in which he lives. It helps students to develop an awareness and

knowledge of social reality to have concern for the wellbeing of the community to undertake appropriate activities design to tackle social problems to promote welfare. The objective of NSS therefore, is "Development of the personality of the students through Community Service."

The faculty of the college always takes initiatives for the benefit of students coming from the rural areas. Most of them are economically backward, intelligent and meritorious but cannot afford higher education, needy and financially hard pressed. Hence, such students are helped to form linkages with the local market at Kinwat and Gokunda where manpower is required. These students spend few hours working for the firm to earn and support themselves. It inculcates in the student the idea that no work is big or small and develops a work culture with the right aptitude.

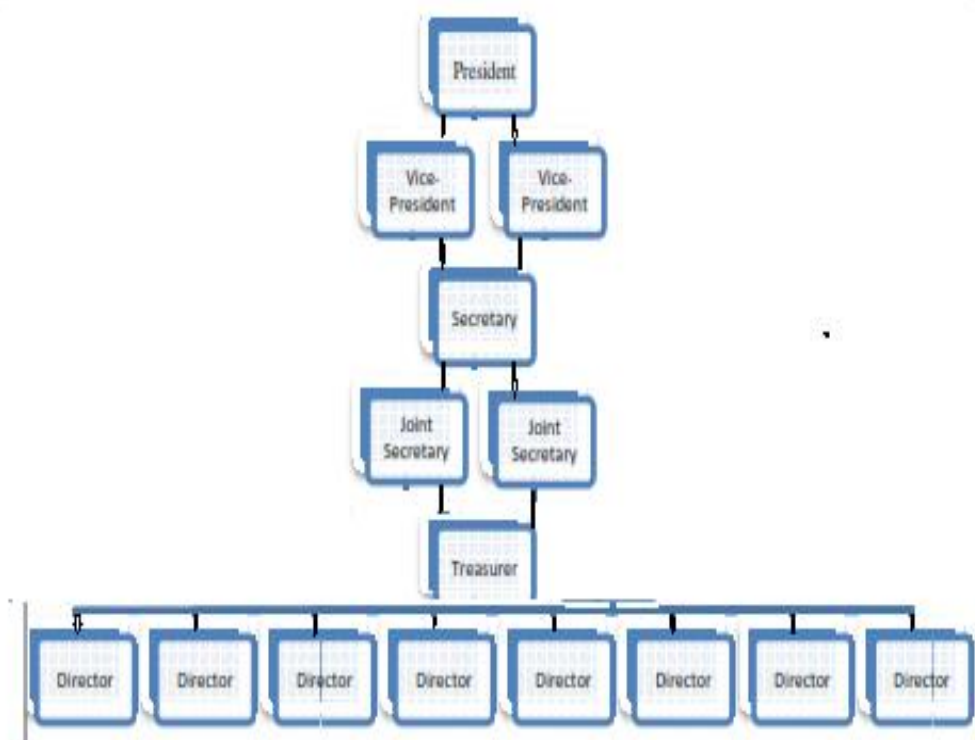

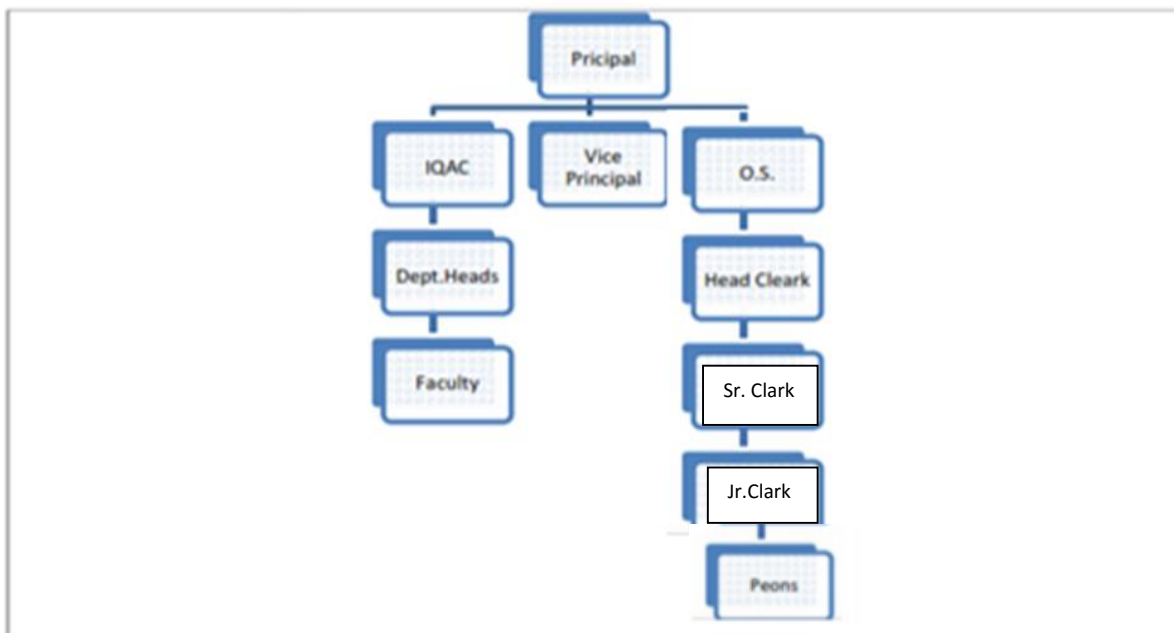

## 7.1 Environment Consciousness

### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes, the college conducts a green audit of its campus and facility. The 20 acre campus of the college is basically rich in trees and other type of plants. The campus is full of greenery and plantations. The NSS, NCC and department of botany is continuously taking care of the existing plantation in the campus. The college adds new plants every year with the help of NSS and NCC department by arranging the plantation camps. The NSS department not only works in the college campus but it also works in adopted villages or environment consciousness through plantation during special camps. The college has also established 'Botanical Garden' in the campus under the supervision of dept of Botany. With the help of Botany students of the college, personal experience of sowing seeds, watering plants, removing weeds etc. is done which results in getting the students ecologically sensitized.

The college is inherently rich in the bio-diversity of plant species. It maintains greenery in the campus since its inception. However, keeping in view the requirement of NAAC, the college started conducting green Audit of its campus since July 2014

### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

#### \* Energy conservation

For energy conservation, the college adopted various techniques like lights and fans are switched off by peon / faculty after completion of lecture. The college displayed the notices near the switch board for proper use of light, fans and other electric devices, to avoid the unnecessary consumption of the energy. The use of CFL bulbs in majority places instead of tungsten lamps reduces the energy consumption in the campus. Recently constructed classroom are made with Sufficient cross ventilation and light so that the use of electricity can be minimized. This shows the institutions commitment towards energy conservation

#### \* Use of renewable energy

The college install solar panel in girls hostel, and planning to boys hostel for installation hot water facility and in administrative building for solar lamps in the campus.

#### \* Water harvesting

Arresting the flow of water in the rainy season is of great significance in view of conservation of water and soil erosion. The college develop the water harvesting system by constructing a big water tank to harvest the rain water in the season. The college practices the channelizing of rain water towards bore wells resulting in raising of the ground water level. The college has constructed a big well in the downal corner (area) of the campus and it is seen that the water level of the well is raised.



**\* Check dam construction**

The college constructs a small dam near the building of boys hostel. If the college succeeds in check dam construction it helps in preventing the soil erosion of the campus and also percolating the water in the soil, increasing the ground water level of the campus.

**\* Efforts for Carbon neutrality**

For carbon neutrality, the college maintains trees and entire greenery in the campus. It helps to raise the oxygen level and reduces the carbon level in the campus. In addition to this, the plantation programmes undertaken by NSS volunteers also help in maintaining carbon neutrality in campus. The botanical garden also contributes in maintaining carbon neutrality in campus.

**\* Plantation**

Variety of trees are planted in last 10 years and maintained to keep the campus green. Large no. of trees already covered the major area of campus and helps to maintain the ecosystem of the area.

**\* Hazardous waste management**

There is an adequate and proper sewage drainage system maintained on the campus. The solid waste of the campus is sorted and categorized in degradable and non-degradable solid waste. The non-degradable solid waste is buried in the tanks at the end of academic years. The degradable solid waste of the campus is collected and dumped into a tank for decomposition. The college has taken initiative to produce the bio fertilizer from solid degradable waste of the campus. Hazardous chemicals of various science laboratories are diluted and safely flushed so as to keep it out of the reach of the students.

**\* e-waste management**

Non-working computers, monitors, printers and their related accessories are discarded and collected at the end of every year. If some parts are useful, they are kept aside for further use in other systems. The nonworking e-waste are dumped in a store room under the supervision of concerned workers. e-waste is handed to the agents or suppliers / scrap dealers.



## 7.2 Innovations

#### **The context:**

Since the college is located in tribal, rural, hilly and educationally backward area, the masses in this region are deprived of medical & education facilities. The visionary social reformer in whose name the college runs had in the contemporary times strived hard to make the people realize importance of health and education in human life. The institution being committed to render every service to the deprived masses of the society, to uplift them and to enable them to lead a dignified life, the practice of organizing blood donation camp on 17th January every year is observed. The dual purpose of selecting 17th January is to commemorate the death anniversary and pay homage to late Shri. Baliramji Patil.

#### **The practice:**

The college observes the practice of organizing 'Blood donation camp' on 17th of January every year. The college is located in tribal, hilly, rural backward area and 150 km away from the district. The facilities concerning health and education are poor. Keeping in view, the importance of blood in human life, the college took initiative to organize the camp every year on the said date which results in saving precious human lives. This being a pious act, the motto of the practice is "Blood Donation Is a Supreme Donation." For no other deed is as precious and valuable than saving the life of fellow human being. The college is involved in observing this practice since 2001 i.e. nearly from 15 years. Near about hundreds of donors have voluntarily donated their blood



during the camp. Not only the students, faculty and employees have actively participated in this practice but also it has involved number of outside volunteers. NSS department of our college organizes a special workshop every year to convince the students about the importance of blood donation and clearing the misconceptions aired regarding the same.

The entire machinery of the college right from management to students actively make themselves involved to make this practice a noble and humble human service visualized by Baliramji Patil.

**Evidence of success:**

The college is proud to boost of the practice as a success where in till date hundreds of beneficiaries have been benefited by the blood donated by the volunteers of our college. Innumerable lives have been saved. The victims of accident and pediatric patients are the special beneficiaries of the practice. The evidence corroborating the stated fact is the appreciation letters and moment to award to the institution to honor the noble service rendered.

**Problems encountered and Resources Required:**

The NSS department of our college in collaboration with Late. Shankarrao Chavan Government Medical College Nanded, organizes blood donation camp on every 17th January. It encounters huge no. of problems, such as mentally preparing the volunteers to donate the blood, infrastructure facilities, medical services and publicizing the event. The pre-donation tests which are mandatory to trace the blood quality is absent. Hence the minimum tests taken at the time of donation are BP and weight of the donor. Blood collection bags, IV set, weighing balance for donors and bags, Expert technician, BTO (Blood transfusion Officer), storage cold box, vehicle for transportation.

## PRACTICE NO. 2

### Title of the practice:

### NOMINAL CHARGE ACCOMMODATION TO THE BOYS AND GIRLS STUDENTS IN HOSTELS.

### Goals:

- ❖ To bring maximum tribal students of the area in the stream of higher education.
- ❖ To provide free accommodation to the needy students so as to encourage them to continue their higher education.

### The context:

Baliram Patil College is located in hilly and tribal region of Nanded district. This is the only multi faculty college of the area. The students admitted to this college are economically backward and mostly belongs to SC, ST and VJNT categories from surrounding villages. Many of them doesn't have the capacity to pay the unaffordable rents of rooms in the town. They are also unable to attend the college regularly, due to lack of money to travel every day from their villages to college. Daily travel for college is a threat for girls students and their parents. Due to this, boys as well as girl students discontinue their education. As a result, many of them dropout from the stream of higher education. Considering all these facts, the college has decided to construct the hostel building for boys and girls in the campus to serve the accommodation to complete their higher education.

### The practice:

Presently the college has separate buildings of boys and girls hostel in the campus. The college started boys hostel from academic year 2004-05 and provided the accommodation to admitted students with minimum rental charges of Rs. 1000/- per year per students. The boys hostel consist of 11 rooms. The rooms are of dormitory type having iron cots, table, fan, shared bathroom and toilets. The number of admitted students in the hostel in the last year was 60. These students availed accommodation on minimum charges of Rs. 1000/- per year per student.

The college constructed a building of girls hostel in the campus. It started from academic year 2012-13 for the accommodation of needy girls students of the college. Girls hostel building comprises 7 dormitory type of rooms. Each room consist of iron bed, fan, table, chair for the student. The bathroom and toilets are common for all girls' students of the hostel. In the same year, the admitted girl students were 38 who were accommodated on minimum charges of Rs.1000/-.

The rector for boys and girls hostel appointed by the college separately monitor the students. Attendance at the college classes is cross checked by the rectors to ensure the presence of the students in the hostel and thereby claim the benefits of all the facilities meant for them.



**Evidence of success:**

The admitted boy and girl students reside in respective hostels with complete discipline. There were no any misconduct reported from the hostels. The students clean their rooms on their own and also maintain the campus clean and neat. The accommodated boy and girl students showed good academic performance during the year. They also participated willingly in extracurricular activities of the college like NSS, NCC, gathering etc. In all, because of the hostel facility provided by the college, the number of boys and girl students completed their UG courses in respective streams.

**Sources required and problems encountered:**

- ❖ There is a need of financial provision for the maintenance of existing hostel buildings.
- ❖ Permanent appointment of rectors for hostels.
- ❖ Compound wall and security staff for hostels.

## POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

### Preface:

Kinwat shikshan sanstha's Baliram Patil Arts, Commerce and Science College is a Grant-in- Aid College. During the first cycle of Accreditation in 2004, the total student strength of the college was 439, of which 332 were male and 107 were female. The vision of the college is to provide quality education to the deprived classes, so the students from the tribal and backward communities like Andh, Gond, Bhil, Pardhan, Boudh, Matang and Banjara form the chunk. Taking into account the objective of empowering women through education, the college since 2004 had been continuously putting its efforts to bring maximum number of girl students in to the streams and provides them girls hostel so as to retain them in the flow as result, the strength of girl students has gone up to 351. The management of college has taken the initiative to develop spacious laboratories in the post accreditation era with all requisite equipments. Many of our faculty members have completed their Ph.D and M.Phil. taking the number from 5 in 2004 to 15 in 2015. Active research involvement is the significant feature of our college. The testimony of the same lies in allotting the land of near about 3.16 acres to develop the Tribal research center to Swami Ramanand teerth Marathwada University, Nanded for developing research centre focusing on the study of tribal lives, schemes and policies and oral traditions. The faculty and students of our college have outshined in research festival called "Avishkar" bagging medals for their extraordinary performance. Mohammad Ashna Ibrahim, Dept. of Botany stood first in the university exam (2014-2015) and bagged Dr. D.S. Mukadam award.

Different college level committees have been added as per the need of time. The anti-sexual harassment committee, anti-ragging committee and various other committees take care of the students and related problems for which they are constituted. A good number of innovative and best practices have been inducted in the college functioning, which boosts the moral of faculty, students, staff, and various other stakeholders. In progress spacious indoor stadium with ultra-modern facilities is one of the significant post accreditation initiatives.

### 1. Curricular Aspects:

In the post accreditation period, the college has organised a workshop on "Restructuring of Marathi Syllabus". As the college is an affiliated institute with limited scope for curriculum design, implementation and flexibility, it registers its opinions through the faculty members who are sent as our representatives through BOS. The following faculty members played a crucial role in curriculum design though indirectly

As has been suggested by the peer team during the first cycle of accreditation in 2004, the college maintains feedback from all the stakeholders and analyzes the same through IQAC for further action. There is a sea change notice in the evaluations process between 2004-5 and 2016-17. In 2004-5, the pattern was annual and the student's performance was assessed by the university. The internal evaluation component was introduced in 2008-9(external-80%+ Internal-20%). In 2009-10, the semester system was introduced for all the UG courses by the university. The university had brought in another change in 2011-12 through introducing MCQ Pattern for the FY and SY students. This Pattern once again had been modified in the last year by restricting the MCQ component to 20%. In 2016-17, the university has introduced CBCS (Choice Based Credit System) for UG-FY students.

## 2. Teaching Learning and Evaluation:

The geographic location of the college ensures that the students admitted belong to the different sections of the society. Since the college is located in tribal and rural area, 51% of its students belong to SC,ST,OBC and Other backward classes which is inline with the reservation policies of state government and university. In 2004-5, the percentage of the same was 38%. The total number of students enrolled in 2004 were 439(107 girl and 332 boys) as against 844 (351 girls and 493 boys) in 2016-17. In the post accreditation era, the college has taken initiative in the use of teaching learning resource by developing and ICT class room for Arts and Commerce stream, which they use on shared basis. All the science departments have been provided independent LCD projectors and computers to make their teaching effective. In addition to this, tests, tutorials, group discussion and class room interactions are the techniques employed by the faculty to identify slow learners. The slow learners are given remedial coaching in zero hours and holidays so that they should match with their peers.

The teacher plan their teaching in accordance with the academic calendar worked out by the IQAC at the beginning. However, they prepare their own individual teaching plans in tune with the academic calendar and maintain ATR (Annual Teaching Report), DTR(daily teaching report), and attendance.

In the post accreditation period, the teacher quality has drastically increased taking the number of Ph.D. teachers to 09 as against 03 in 2004. In 2004, the teachers who completed their M.Phil. were only two and today they are five. Six of our faculty members are pursuing doctoral programmes. Almost all of our teachers have successfully completed their faculty development programmes and enrolled their participation in seminar, workshop, conferences and symposia. 47 paper are published in reputed journals whereas 29 papers were presented in state/ National/ International conferences in post accreditation period.

The university has effected revolutionary changes in the last seven years to make the evaluation methods more result oriented. The students are timely informed about the changes in the evaluation methods through displaying notices in the notice board, making announcements in the classroom.



### 3. Research Consultancy and Extension:

The college has a very vibrant research culture. The action of allotting 3.16 acres of land to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded for developing tribal research center substantiates the above mentioned fact. Apart from this, the college has recognized research lab in Zoology and two students pursuing their research under the supervision of Dr. Maqdoom Mohiuddin have been awarded doctoral degree. In the post accreditation era, with the support of management, the college has developed spacious chemistry lab, zoology lab, botany lab, Maths lab, physics lab and computer lab facilitating research. Six of our faculty members gained recognition as research supervisors and eight research students are pursuing their doctoral programme under the supervision of our faculty. In 2004, only one MRP was undertaken by the college faculty, in 2015-16 the status of MRP is 6 projects completed and one ongoing.

The college being located in rural and tribal area, the scope for consultancy is meager. Still, the zealous faculty of our college offer free of cost consultancy services in the area of water testing and soil testing. The NSS unit of our college is indulged in constructive extension activities such as Polling awareness rallies, staging street plays, tree plantation, blood donation, women empowerment programmes, pulse- polio drive, sanitation, eradicating superstition etc. Besides, we have anti-ragging cell, anti- sexual harassment cell, SC/ST cell which takes care of the rights of the students who fall under the jurisdiction of the respective cell. The college feels proud about its services in extension area in the post accreditation period contributing to the holistic development of the students.

### 4. Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

It is the duty of every higher education institute to provide adequate infrastructure and technology to its students and faculty to facilitate smooth teaching- learning and personality grooming. Keeping the same in mind, we as an institute have developed girls hostel funded by the UGC for encouraging maximum girls to enter into the educational stream. The college also provides mess facility to both boys and girls residing in the hostel. In the post accreditation period, the college took into its hands the task of developing a spacious indoor stadium for our students which is funded by UGC. After 2004, the college has built a separate wing constituting office, Principals chamber, Management room, IQAC, Ladies room. A spacious laboratory for all the science departments is the post Accreditation feature. The Dept. of Botany has taken initiative in developing a very useful botanical garden with rare species during the post Accreditation period.

The Library as a learning resource has been shifted to a more spacious and comfortable zone. In the post Accreditation era, the library has been fully computerized by installing SOUL.2 software. In the first cycle of Accreditation, the library had nearabout 20,000 texts and reference books as against 32360 texts and reference books in 2015-16. The notable addition to the library resource is the N-List facility which provides online access to 138500 books and 6,300 journals.





## 5. Student support and progression:

The top priority of our institute is our student community. Therefore, we are always in the forefront when the question of student mentoring arises. The college has developed good number of support facilities for our students on the campus. It publishes the prospectus annually which consist information about the vision, mission, objectives, fee structure, courses offered, faculty information, financial assistance available and other support facilities available on the campus.

The college is keen on focusing all round development of the students and hence it encourages the students to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities conducted by the college for personality development. The college through its career guidance cell offers the first hand information about job opportunities available and the skills required. The SC/ST cell of our college keep the students updated about various government schemes and facilities meant for their welfare. The Anti-ragging cell of our college is vigilant and keeps an eye on the conduct of the students to ensure that no amount of misconduct/ misbehavior on the campus is reported. The anti-sexual harassment cell of our college is very active in its functioning and organizes various programmes like expert talks on the legal and social rights of women, in order to bring awareness among them. In the post accreditation period, many a new committees have been formed and added to the existing one as per the need of time to support the students psychologically, financially and academically. The NSS, NCC unit of our college undertake constructive programmes like AIDS awareness day, women empowerment programmes, tree plantation, blood donation, cleanliness drive, sanitation etc. which results in contributing to national development. The college is proud to boast that it has produced a corpus of alumni which is offering its valuable services in various professions making its alma-matter and the nation proud.

## 6. Governance, Leadership and Management:

Baliram Patil Arts, Commerce and Science College is run by Kinwat shikshan santha, Kinwat. The society is responsible for designing policy decisions, recruitment of staff and monitoring the internal mechanism. The principal acts as a coordinating link between the staff and management. He is the member secretary of the LMC. The principal is given full autonomy to formulate and implement policies for the development.

In order to ensure quality mechanism in educational as well as administrative matters, the IQAC along with the principal plays a crucial role. Meetings of IQAC with staff, non-teaching and other stakeholders at regular intervals ensure quality check in the institutional academic sector. The establishment of IQAC is a post accreditation initiative. The evaluation of the teachers is done through self-appraisal (PBAS) and through maintaining confidential reports (ACR).

The management implements a few welfare schemes for the teaching and non-teaching staff. The K.S.S. credit cooperative society, a body of employees extends loan facilities to its members for various purposes such as medical and emergency loan.

## 7. Innovative and Best Practices:





Higher education institutes are the centers where innovative and best practices are given birth to. One who changes with changing times and adapts to the environment succeeds and finds itself on the path of the progress. Accordingly, in the post accreditation era, the institute has introduced a good number of healthy practices in all walks of life. Evaluation reforms, use of ICT in teaching learning, language club, and involvement in research and allotting 3.16 acres of land for developing tribal research Centre, developing girls hostel and providing mess facility, indoor stadium, library renovation, botanical garden are the highlights of post accreditation best practices seen in the institute.

The college through its NSS unit inculcates the spirit of civic responsibilities. It is regular practice in the college organizing functions to commemorate birth and death anniversaries of the freedom fighters, social thinkers, social reformers and great scientist to set role models for students. Apart from this, we whole heartedly participate in promoting national issues through organizing rallies and creating awareness among the masses through expert lecture on issues like women empowerment, blood donation, AIDS, Polling awareness, pulse-polio, eradicating superstition, sexual harassment at work place etc.

The management encourages its teaching faculty to come out with innovative practices. Two of the most important innovative practices which have been developed in the post accreditation era are:

1. Blood donation camp.

2. Minimum charge accommodation for boys and girls.
